

President's report

Welcome to the winter edition of the TCA Newsletter. With the rhythm of the seasons, the Winter Solstice has again passed and we now welcome the lengthening of the days.

During the chilly weather and short days we are naturally inclined to spend more time indoors. However there are still some Taroona residents beavering away outside. The Taroona Neighbourhood Garden team has been very busy constructing garden beds and growing produce. The garden is beautiful and a wonderful asset for the Taroona community. We also congratulate the garden on their recent success with obtaining grants from the Tasmania Community Fund and Kingborough Council which will fund the construction of a fence, fruit trees and other garden infrastructure. More details of the garden can be found in the newsletter.

The Kingborough Council walking track team have also been busy upgrading and rerouting sections of the Alum Cliffs walking track south of Taronga Road that were closed for the past year due to poor repair and safety issues. Sections of the track have been re-routed away from the cliffs to avoid further impacts on some large Aboriginal middens. Fencing has been upgraded, and I understand further works are still to be completed. These track works are welcomed but the TCA holds strongly to its vision for a high quality walking track extending the length of the Alum Cliffs from Kingston through to Taroona, and will continue to advocate for its re-establishment.

The old Taroona Hotel sight is now the home of the new Storm Bay unit complex. Stage 1 contains seven units, a restaurant and bar. The TCA has been informed that the units will be on the market as of early July, and it is planned that the restaurant may be open as soon as September. Stage 2 is to be commenced in a couple of months and entails the demolition of the neighbouring house on Channel Highway and the construction of six units. I understand the old house once operated as Taroona's post-office.

After many years of looking at a derelict building, it is hoped that the unit and restaurant development will re-invigorate this area of Taroona. All we need now is a shop!

Taroona Primary School

Finally, a multi-purpose room!

Taroona Primary School was opened on the present site in 1960 without an indoor general purpose area for large gatherings. Our school community has been lobbying various government personnel and agencies since 1981 in relation to our need for a multi-purpose room.

In 2001 the Department of Education funded architectural services and community consultation for a new facility, and final plans and costs were produced. Early in 2007 we were granted \$1.7 million in state

government funding to build our long awaited multi purpose room.

Construction commenced in June. The new facilities will include a 24 m x 12 m multi purpose room with stage, a kitchen facility, a new early childhood classroom, new student toilets, new storage areas, rainwater tank, solar hot water, a revamped school entrance, a resurfaced netball/basketball court and a new administration area.

It is a very exciting time for our school community and we are hopeful that the project will be completed by the end of the 2008 school year.

- 1. TEN is Taroona Environment Network Incorporated
- 2. TEN is a volunteer community (Coastcare/Bushcare) group, formed in 1997 to revegetate foreshore and gully reserves and educate the community about bushland rehabilitation and habitat restoration
- 3. TEN has spent hundreds of hours removing invasive coastal weeds along our foreshore (boneseed, cotoneaster, banana passionfruit, blackberry, boxthorn, briar rose etc) and replanting with native species
- 4. TEN is delighted to have the assistance of a Green Corps team weeding and planting in some of our work areas for the next few months.
- 5. TEN has engaged Northbarker Ecosystem Services to prepare Action Plans for our work areas, funded by a Commonwealth Government Envirofund grant.
- 6. TEN is one of the most successful and long-running coastcare groups in Tasmania.
- 7. TEN members average age is 40 yrs!

A celebration was held at the Taroona Neighbourhood Garden on the evening of Saturday June 21st, to mark the Solstice and the achievement of significant funding for the garden. Grants from the Tasmanian Community Fund and Kingborough Council will fund the professional construction of a sturdy fence and screening for the compost works, and purchase of plants and equipment.

About 50 people, ranging in age from babies upwards, and all well rugged up against the cold, enjoyed the cheerful atmosphere created by the heat from two braziers, hot snags and veggie burgers from the BBQ, the light from pumpkin heads and lanterns constructed by the little Possums. Thanks to Gary and Helen from For Bread Bakery at the shopping centre for donation of several loaves of lovely fresh bread.

All plots in the garden have been allocated but there is a waiting list, and plots may become available soon. Those interested are invited to join as Supporting

Members (only \$10 a year) and learn about composting, organic gardening and how to build a vegetable plot in your own back yard.

The two largest beds in the garden are 'community beds' and as soon as the produce in them has reached harvest it will be sold at low cost or given away.

The Salvation Army welcomes donations of clean wearable clothing, household goods and small electrical items in GOOD working order including DVD players. They cannot use heaters (except oil filled column heaters) BBQs, VCRs, large electrical equipment or broken or stained furniture.

Call Salvation Army Home Collection on 131640, or drop off items at their store during working hours.

Both organizations stress that they must bear the considerable cost of cartage and disposal of unsuitable donations, amounting to thousands of dollars a year!
