The State Government has approved the funding of \$2 million for the redevelopment and updating of Taroona High School's facilities. The major construction phase will take place in 2003-04.

The Taroona High School Band will be touring Sydney, Canberra and Melbourne from 25 to 31 August. The program for the thirty-two students includes performances in Sydney and a workshop with Don Burrows.

## Taroona park redevelopment


Kingborough Council has approved plans for the redevelopment of Taroona Park at a cost of over \$400,000. One of the major features of this redevelopment is the construction of a skate park, which should begin in October/November 2002 and be completed before the summer school holidays. The location and design of the skate park has been finalised after extensive community consultation over the last year and a half.

Other recreational facilities also approved include pathways and trails, improved car parking, upgrading of the foreshore toilet block and

fixing the storm water erosion problems on the foreshore. The picnic shelters and barbecue facilities will also be upgraded with most of the work being done by the Taroona Apex Club. Chiton Close will be closed and the old road converted to a walking trail and planted with endemic species, including blue gums to improve the habitat for swift parrots. Willows and other weeds will be removed from the park and the sand dunes will be protected with fencing.

Detailed plans are available from Kingborough Council.

## Mary's Grange extension

Mary's Grange Nursing Home is now much closer to obtaining the go-ahead for its \$2.75 million building program which will see 25 new low care beds available for the elderly of our community. A Memorandum of Understanding between the Home and several of its Grange Avenue neighbours should be signed within the next few weeks, hopefully resolving the concerns of residents and bringing to an end the series of disputes that has plagued the project for months. Once the MOU is signed and the plans redesigned, the proposal will be taken back to the Resource Management and Planning Appeal Tribunal where it is expected to be approved.

Detailed site plans then will be drawn up, the tender let and, all being well, the nine-month

construction period started before the end of the year. This will mean that residents could be using the new low-care facility by Christmas 2003.



The new wing, which will now have a pitched rather than a wave roof, and which will be set back from the boundaries much further than required by council, will provide 23 low care beds. The other two new bed licences will be provided within the existing complex. Mary's Grange currently provides care for 74 high-care and 14 low-care residents and has 20 independent living units at Grange Villas.

## Taroona Gardening Forum

The Taroona Gardening Forum meets on the first Wednesday evening of each month at 7.30pm in the Uniting Church Hall, Taroona Crescent. A reminder of the meeting is usually to be found in *The Mercury* Community Diary on the day of the meeting.

The Forum exchanges information on plants, both ornamental and edible, and members range from the expert to the novice. The sharing of such knowledge and the exchange of plants, seeds, cuttings etc is on an extremely informal basis and all gardeners, be they novice or expert, are most welcome.

An integral part of the Forum's activities is to undertake regular field trips to gardens and farms throughout southern Tasmania, including members own gardens. Whenever possible picnics are arranged on these trips.

Members receive a simple monthly newsletter outlining the agenda for the next meeting and an update of the forthcoming field trips.

September's activities include a visit to a daffodil farm at Surges Bay and a private garden at Middleton. Visits to a tulip farm at Bothwell and an organic orchard in Petchey's Bay are planned for October.

Annual subscription is \$5 for a family, \$3 for a single member. The monthly Wednesday evening meeting attracts a \$1 per head fee to cover the hire of the hall.

## Attention dog owners

The following is an extract from a letter received from a concerned resident. The Association shares the concern and supports the views expressed in the letter.

*"Our property consists of some acreage at Taroona where we have a small flock of sheep. On Sunday 7 July at around midday, two dogs roamed onto our land and savagely attacked some of our pet sheep. The sheep were severely mangled by the dogs and subsequently had to be destroyed. This is not the first time that such an incident has occurred. One of the dogs was of large build, with a short black or dark brown coat. The second dog was of medium build and had a long black coat. We notified Kingston Police, who informed us that action can be taken in these matters. We strongly urge dog owners in the area to be responsible and to make sure that their pets are contained and are not free to wander."*

Taroona was the name given to the chiton (sea shell) by the "Tribes about Mount Royal, Bruny Island, Recherche Bay and the South of Tasmania" (as recorded by Joseph Milligan in 1890).

## Taroona — a cool community

Last year a nationwide project, called Cool Communities, was launched. Cool Communities aims to



engage Australian people directly in learning how to significantly reduce their energy use in homes and private transport — the aim being to reduce greenhouse gas emissions caused by the domestic sector. (These account for about 20 percent of the nation's greenhouse gas emissions).

Around Australia, 173 communities applied for funding for these programs. Of these, 22 were successful and are now getting underway.

The Taroona Schools project is one of the successful bidders. During the coming year Taroona High and Taroona Primary will be working with the Tasmania Bicycle Council on a range of creative transport initiatives in the wider community. The aim is to demonstrate that significant reductions in private transport can be made, giving

many benefits aside from greenhouse gas reductions. School students as well as their families will be participating.

A number of households connected to the school community will be invited to have a special role, monitoring their travel patterns and feeding creative ideas into the program. This vital information will be used to provide policy advice to the Australian Greenhouse Office for nationwide application.

The Taroona project is unique in being the only project out of the 22 successful bidders that is transport related. (All the others focus on household energy conservation.) Project team leader is Leslie Tse from the Tasmania Bicycle Council, who has strong connections with the school community.

The project will be kicking off early in third term.

## Residents in the news

Fourth generation Taroona resident Jon Reeve has been awarded the 2002 Australian Antarctic Medal. The award, an acknowledgment of outstanding commitment and service to Australia's Antarctic work over many years, was announced on Midwinters Day by the Governor-General Dr Peter Hollingworth. An electronics engineer, Jon's work has underpinned several major Australian Antarctic marine science projects.

Sue Schaap has been recognised for her work with pre-tertiary chemistry students at Claremont College with a State Award in the 2002 Learning Together Awards for Educational Excellence.

Vice President of the Taroona Community Association and Kingborough Councillor Simon Baptist was recently presented with the University of Tasmania's annual Rona Hagger Memorial Prize. This prize is awarded to the student who has achieved the best results in an undergraduate degree which has included a major sequence from Economics, Political Science, Psychology or Sociology. Rona Hagger was one of the pioneers of social work in Tasmania and the award is related to those disciplines in recognition of that.

Erna Brigg was ordained as a priest at St David's Cathedral on 6 July and will be continuing her ministry in the Anglican communities of Taroona and Sandy Bay.



*Local Taroona artist Jane Burrell and scientist Dr Greg Joudan have collaborated over four years to produce "Changing Worlds", a poster showing the evolution of Tasmania's environment. Jane's paintings show how one place changed over the last 50 million years – with rainforests, volcanoes and glaciers developing and then disappearing, and finally people bringing their own dramatic impacts. The place is imaginary but similar to the north west area of the state. The dolerite mountain was based on Mt Wellington. Greg's maps and text explain the changes.
