Our community and local government

Taroona Community Association committee members attended a public information forum at Margate in late July to explore how local community committees can participate n the local government decision making process. Two Kingborough Councillors (Greg Whitten and David Grace) organised the meeting, following approaches from several community organisations At least 100 Kingborough residents filled Margate Hall, demonstrating the high level of interest in this issue.

Representatives from two Tasmanian municipalities spoke about systems for participation in Local Government based on local committees.

Northern Midlands Mayor, Kim Polley, spoke on the success of her council's Local District Committee System which commenced in 1993 following the amalgamation of four municipalities. The system allows a degree of autonomy within the Northern Midlands Council, and Special Management Committees have been established to manage Council assets such as halls, community centres and swimming pools.

Beres Taylor from Collinsvale Precinct

Committee spoke about Glenorchy City's Precinct Committee Program. Twelve local precinct committees contribute to the Glenorchy Council's decision making. Each committee services an average of 3000 people. A recent review indicated the majority of Glenorchy householders want it to continue.

It was clearly evident that the precinct committee system is successful only if Councils provide them with adequate resources and a level of trust in the local community's capacity.

The outcome of the meeting was an overwhelming support for two motions:

- 1. A strong recommendation that Kingborough Council initiate immediate steps to establish a precinct committee system including provision for local and special management committees for the Kingborough Local Government Area.
- 2. The meeting form a working group with representatives from each community association to develop a model of a precinct system and promote this model to the next Council election.

Sydney Track International Club Inc. were heard in the Resource and Planning Appeals Tribunal from 19-23 July. The objections were presented by the Art Deco Society and a group of Taroona residents. It is expected that a decision will be delivered in late August.

In the meantime Kingborough Council has advertised amendments to the Council's Planning Scheme which will redefine the future development parameters of this site. The previous article in this issue provides greater detail. *IillHickie*

Tree removal

Any tree **over 10 m** in height requires a permit from Kingborough Council BEFORE you can lop or remove it. Application forms to fell or lop trees are available from Council and

inspections are carried out once an application is submitted. If Council consider removal of the tree is unnecessary, and you still wish to pursue its removal, an arborist's report will be required outlining the specific reasons why the tree should be removed (eg health or danger). Council will then reassess your application. If you proceed with removing a tree over 10 m without Council approval, you may be fined in accordance with Council's Tree Protection Policy. Why? Because mature trees can have important landscape and natural values to our community, including providing critical habitat for threatened fauna species.

Parko's Garden Maintenance Service

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The list has not been reviewed or added to by the Council since 1988. Buildings listed in the Kingborough region by the Tasmanian Heritage Council or the Register of the National Estate are automatically added to the list. Additionally, there may be some concern for adjoining property owners because it would permit demolition of buildings without the Kingborough Council imposing conditions appropriate to prevent damage to or undermining of adjacent or adjoining properties.

Amendment A32 (Taroona Hotel Site)

There are 6 parts to the changes of this amendment which are all interrelated. Essentially the essence of the amendments is that it changes what can happen on the Taroona Hotel site - allowing more of a mixed use within the Business and Civic Zone; allowing a taller building to be built, and

altering the Statement of Future Desired Character (essentially the vision statement) to determine the parameters for a multi-storeved residential development on this site.

Amendment 10

Rezone Taroona Primary and High Schools and P33 Nubeena Crescent (Wildlife Research Centre) from Residential to Business and Civic. Insert a new desired future character statement and strategy for P33 Nubeena Crescent. In addition, minor rezoning of northern section of 104 Channel Highway, Taroona from Residential to Environmental Management.

If you can't find us - we've gone walkabout!

TEN has introduced a monthly walkabout for local residents to explore areas of interest in our suburb. The first walkabout was in June, led by Peter Grant (author of 'Habitat Garden', ABC books). An interesting and pleasant time was had strolling around several Taroona gardens, exploring habitats for our local wildlife. This walkabout was designed to complement TEN's 'Habitat Gardening in Taroona' brochure, distributed to every Taroona household with the last TCA newsletter (if you didn't get one, contact us). We hope you've been inspired to use some of our local natives amongst your other plantings to help out the local wildlife. In July, 50 people went walkabout with Simon Stephens, discovering the dynamic landscape in which we live. A fascinating few hours were spent discovering the geological formation of our suburb, taking a close-up look at rocks, fossils and soils beneath our feet, including an enlightening experiment to test the soil stability of various parts of Taroona. And by the time you receive

this newsletter, Jemery Day will have led people on our August walkabout a bird-watching morning at Truganini Reserve. Details of the next series of walkabouts is on the enclosed leaflet and sounds like great fun! Meanwhile, TEN's regular working bees have been chugging along. A very satisfying August working bee was held at Harrow Place - a significant roadside reserve adjoining Channel Highway - where we began to remove banana passionfruit, boneseed, cotoneaster and blackberry. The native plants amongst them are now breathing a sigh of relief. Other working bees at Illawong Reserve, Niree Parade, Hinsby Gully and Melinga Place were also held, doing the usual variety of work to help restore our native coastal and gully vegetation and habitats for wildlife.

We still have hundreds of plants to get in the ground before summer. Check out the working bee dates below to see when you're available. We'd love your help! Kingborough Planning Scheme

Kingborough Council recently advertised a long list (32) of amendments proposed for the newly completed Kingborough Planning Scheme. Some affect Taroona and this article outlines their content. Representations were to be submitted to Council by 23rd August .

Amendment A29 - Demolition

The Council wishes to include a clause in the Scheme that means that any substantial structure (house, shop, etc.) can be demolished without requiring the owner to get a permit or notify the public. This means a structure can be demolished at any time without notification. This does not apply to structures on the Council's heritage list.
