

## History of the Land Use from 1939 to present for the parcel of land on the corner of Channel Highway and Karingal Court (currently part of Tarooma High and Tarooma Primary school properties and owned by the Crown (Dept. of Education))

Date	Event	Comment
Feb 1939	Rotary Club of Hobart purchase land from – Vernon Hookey, William Sorell, William Fletcher and Edward Bedsford for £600 for the purpose of establishing a holiday camp for needy kids and families. Mr Dixon leased the land, raised cattle and was in agreement with the sale provided his cattle could still run there. Through the good offices of David Meredith in 1944, the Electrolytic Zinc Company purchased another 4 acres adjoining the original land to give access to the foreshore. Eventually the campsite consisted of 9 acres of heavily timbered land.	This was during the depression. The Club worked hard, raised money and established buildings. Premier Robert Cosgrove opened the site in 16th Feb 1940. A caretaker's residence was also established. Rotarian, Max Geeves arranged for the levelling of the sports' areas. 1964	The Hobart Rotary Club sold the property for £17,750 to the Crown however the sale was delayed because of zoning issues. The Land had been zoned by the Kingborough Council to be used for public recreational purposes.	The costs of maintaining the camp were high, the Tarooma suburb was developing, residential land a premium. The sale was to the Crown. No original source can be found regarding who was the new owner but it's presumed it was the Crown and subsequently the Education Dept have maintained the land. <i>Can anyone help with an original source? 1967	The Bushfire destroyed all the buildings. Some concrete foundations remain.
