You may have noticed an electronic automated timer on one of the southern perimeter taps.

Please do not change the tap as we are monitoring the flow to both fruit trees and berries to get the balance right. We will hope for a greater harvest this coming season. The fruit tree loops have been in for a couple of years now and some have needed repair. If you notice any needing attention please let Bridget of myself know about it.

A hessian wrap around the trunk helps just so long as it is checked every couple of weeks and the lava found are destroyed.
