Seed saving

Consider collecting seed for planting next season. Tomato seeds can be spread on a paper towel and left to dry.

Dry seeds head can be popped in a paper bag and left till seeds fall. Label any seeds and store in envelopes in a cool dry place.

Planting

April is the month for planting members of the onion family – Leeks, onions and garlic. The family likes lime so they will benefit from a handful of dolomite or gypsum.

Cabbages, cauliflower, broccoli, silver beet, spinach and Chinese greens can be planted in March and April. Replenishing your plot with fertiliser will help .promote sturdy growth through the cooler months.

Bed Repairs

After 10 years some plots are very much in need of some attention. The wood at the ends is rotting and the sides sadly bulging. David Coleman will work with you to make the necessary repairs.

Oxalis

There had been a mysterious increase in the amount of oxalis in the community plots and some beds. At this time of the year it is reproducing new bulbs. Please remove carefully and discard to the wheelie bin. Leaving it or putting it in the compost means it will spread rapidly. If we are all vigilant oxalis can be eliminated.
