All proceeds of the sales go to Clarendon Children's Homes. This year's result exceeded all expectations and the previous record, reaching a total of \$8300.

From the President

It's been a long time since snow has blanketed the hills and gardens of Tarooma. On Thursday, 11 August residents awoke to a stunningly, beautiful white Hobart with 5 cm of snow recorded in Tarooma. While snowflakes quietly floated down to the ground, some of us ventured outside to play and throw the odd snowball to commemorate this rare occasion. The snow has thawed and we now have returned to our daily lives.

Local Government elections are coming up in October. The elections were postponed from late last year due to the review of the *Local Government Act 1993*. Kingborough and, more locally, Tarooma ratepayers have the opportunity to vote in a new council. Voting in Local Government elections is not compulsory and historically only a small proportion of the population has voted. The introduction of postal voting has significantly increased the proportion of population voting but it still is a minority.

If you are interested in what happens in your suburb and municipality - now and in the future - I urge you to vote.

The TCA postponed the date of our July

general meeting to allow the owners of the Tarooma Shopping Centre, Urban Village Shopping, to speak at a general meeting in August and inform residents of the renovations and answer questions. My apologies to those residents who may have arrived at the hall for the July meeting unaware of these changes.

Taroona Shopping Centre News

Andrew Darroch from Urban Village Design addressed the August TCA general meeting and presented the audience with an exciting summary of the plans for the shopping centre. Visuals reflecting the new floor layout, and artists impressions of the finished shopping centre and the landscape design were displayed.

Features

- *New floor layout
 - *Closure of side entrances and new entrance through current northern wall
 - *Removal of archway (community feedback strongly indicated "the archway needs to go!" - so it's gone..)
 - *Decked area next to the main entrance leading to a cafe space
 - *New plumbing, electricals and heating
 - *Creation of a community display and meeting space/lounge room in the central area (currently where you enter the supermarket).
 - *New internal and external paintwork
 - *Improved and contemporary signage
 - *Renovated toilets, new disabled toilet and parents room
 - *New entrance to the supermarket
 - *New shop fronts featuring 2.8 m high aluminium and glass facades to bring more light into the shops
 - *Space for regular community displays
 - *Exciting landscape design by Hobart landscape architects, Inspiring Place featuring a planted pedestrian avenue leading from Channel Highway through to Bachelor Way.
 - *A baker has recently signed a lease for the old bakery
 - *Other interest expressed includes a hairdresser and delicatessen.
- The timeframe is for completion by Christmas, however progress is slow and difficult as building is taking place whilst the shopping centre is still occupied. Undoubtedly the tenants will let you know how difficult it has been for them as well.

Homes for penguins



A new project, **Community Action for Penguins (CAP)**, is keen to work with members of the Taroona community to ensure the survival of

the local little penguins. CAP, which is Stage 2 of the **Derwent Estuary Penguin Project**, will put into action recommendations of Stage 1, which found only 70 breeding pairs still living in the Derwent estuary. The penguins lead a precarious life, threatened by stray dogs and cats, and find it difficult to raise chicks.

The CAP project aims to provide safe homes for penguins by protecting and improving nesting areas between Sandy Bay and Tinderbox. The work will include removing weeds, planting coastal species, and installing burrows and signage. There will be school and community workshops to learn about building burrows and penguin lifestyles.

Taroona schools will help to establish a new Community Penguin Colony by constructing artificial burrows. The **Taroona Environment Network (TEN)** will contribute by removing

weeds and creating burrows at Alum Cliffs, complementing TEN's current Envirofund project of restoring foreshore vegetation.

The project is an initiative of the Derwent Estuary Program, and is funded by the Australian Government's Envirofund through the Natural Heritage Trust, with additional support provided by the Tasmanian Conservation Trust, Wrest Point, Biodiversity Conservation Branch (DPIWE), Hobart City Council, Kingborough Council, Parks and Wildlife Service, Taroona Environment Network and Birds Tasmania.
